

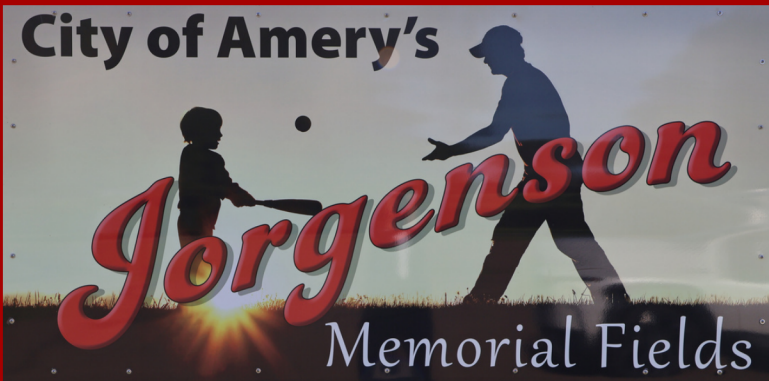

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Jorgenson Memorial Fields

"I wish more people could experience what I experienced with how the community came together." -Eric Wojchik



Konny Jorgenson met with the AHS Softball team to talk about her son and husband, Andy and Dave, and share the story of Jorgenson Memorial Fields where the softball team practices and competes. For the team, this created a meaningful connection between the team and the field they call home.

It was Dave Jorgenson's dream to play on the same softball team with his son Andy. Dave loved to play softball, and it was important for him to 'stay in shape' until Andy was old enough to play with him. When Andy turned 18, Dave's dream became a reality as the two of them played men's slow pitch softball together on two teams: the Russell's Sport & Bike team in New Richmond and the Tac II team in Amery.

On August 1, 2001, on their way to play softball at Hatfield Park in New Richmond, both Dave and Andy died as the result of a traffic accident. Andy was 20 years old, and Dave was 50.

Dave was born and raised in the Amery area, graduating from AHS in 1969. He was a high school athlete and a lifelong softball player. His wife Konny taught music at Amery Schools for 35 years, and they raised their two children, Andy and Emily, in Amery. Dave enjoyed coaching little league baseball and flag football, and he was an avid Amery Warriors sports fan.

Andy played Warrior baseball, football, basketball, and golf. After graduating from AHS in 1999, he earned an Associate degree in Computer Networking from Chippewa Valley Technical College and was planning to continue his education in fall of 2001 at UW River Falls with his lifelong friend Eric Wojchik.

Eric and Andy spent so much time together while growing up that people often mistook them for brothers, and Dave was a father-figure for Eric.

Months after the tragic loss, Eric approached Konny with an idea. He wanted "something good to come out of this tragedy." That was the very beginning of the Jorgenson Memorial Fields softball facility.

At the time, there was an active men's softball league playing in downtown Amery at Soldier's Field. Soldier's Field was small, often wet, and in poor condition. A new Amery community softball facility was the perfect way to memorialize two men who loved softball and who loved Amery.

In 2002, the project 'got legs' with a lot of help from the men's softball league. A fundraising committee was formed, and a fund was established through the Amery Community Foundation. The City of Amery offered the use of two plots of land: Griffin Street where the hospital now stands or Minneapolis Avenue adjacent to the school campus. Eric chose the land next to the school because he had a vision of a three-field complex with two community fields and an adjacent high school softball field on the school property. The school field never transpired, but the two community fields remained in the plan.



Substantial fundraising, planning, and marketing occurred in 2003. Through grants and donations, about \$300,000 was raised.



The mission of the School District of Amery is to foster academic excellence, lifelong learning, and citizenship.



The two playing fields were built in 2004 along with a building for concessions, storage, and bathrooms. By spring of 2005, the fields were ready for play.

Jorgenson Fields was the result of generous donations of money, materials, and especially TIME. Eric said that they “drew upon a lot of skillsets in the slow pitch softball community to build it.”

The first games were played in May of 2005 with an active and large softball association and local church league. For seventeen years Jorgenson Fields was used for softball league games, softball tournaments, and events hosted by other organizations. The Amery Softball Association collected fees for field use, scheduled games and events, maintained the fields, and continued with upgrades. The city contributed by mowing the fields and winterizing the building.

When the school started renting the fields for AHS Girls Softball in 2011, they contributed the field prep for the high school games and occasional weed control.

Unfortunately, over time, interest in men’s softball declined, and eventually the Amery men’s softball league dissolved. By the summer of 2023, the only regular use of

Jorgenson Fields included the high school team and the youth booster fastpitch league.

In the summer of 2023, the school district began planning considerable improvements to all the outdoor athletic facilities on campus including football, soccer, track & field, and baseball. The softball fields were also in need of improvements, but the school district could not upgrade what it did not own. District Administrator Shawn Doerfler approached Konny, Eric, and the city about potentially purchasing Jorgenson Fields for school and community use. In January of 2024, the city and school reached an agreement, and the Amery City Council approved the sale in February. Jorgenson Memorial Fields is now owned by the school district and will be renovated as part of the overall athletic complex improvements.

Jorgenson Fields will look very different in 2025 with relocated fences, new dugouts, new bleachers, a press box, and more. Improvements will be prioritized for high school softball but will also accommodate youth softball and little league baseball.

It will look different, but according to Doerfler, “The School District of Amery is steadfast in their commitment to honoring the legacy of Dave and Andy Jorgenson. It is our aim to fill Jorgenson Field with softball and baseball players for years to come. We are humbled to be a small part of a good story which arose from tragedy some two decades ago. The property may have changed hands, but to the School District of Amery these fields will forever be proudly called Jorgenson Fields.”

The Jorgenson Field Memorial Fund will remain as a long-term non-endowed field of interest fund in perpetuity. A grant application is available providing access to those funds for youth baseball, booster softball, and city-owned youth recreation facilities and fields.

Though it was never part of the plan for the school to eventually own the facility, Konny is “happy to see they will have more use, will be kept up, updated, and used for more than just school softball.” She is thrilled that the fields will be used by the community as well as the school.

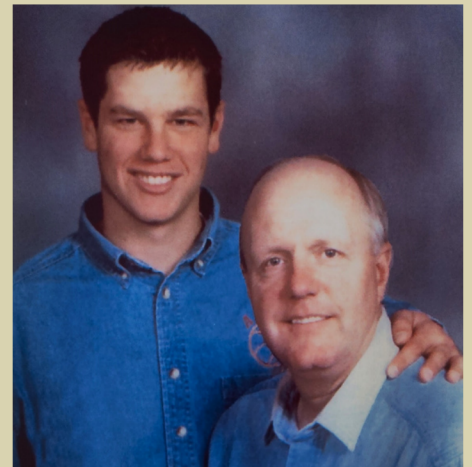
For Eric, the changes are bittersweet because the focus of the initial vision was community softball. He is pleased that the Jorgenson Field Memorial Fund will be preserved in perpetuity, that the facility is respected in the community, and he appreciates that it will be used for a long time.

Eric said, “I will always live with a little bit of unfinished business because we never finished the fields with lights.” The electrical work was done, but due to cost, lights were never installed. More importantly, Eric has a deep appreciation for the volunteers who donated their time, money, blood, sweat, and tears to build Jorgenson Memorial Fields. He will always be indebted to them and will never forget how the community supported an idea.

“I wish more people could experience what I experienced with how the community came together,” said Eric. “It’s a big part of why I wanted to raise my family here.”

In the spring of 2025, at the newly renovated fields, Konny will throw the first pitch at the first Amery Warriors Varsity Girls Softball game. She had a custom bench made that will be placed at the fields as a reminder of why Jorgenson Memorial Fields exists. The bench is engraved with a photo of Andy and Dave along with the words, **“Lived Together, Played Together, Laughed Together, Left Together.”**

MONTESSORI SHOW & SHARE

The Lien Elementary Montessori classrooms hosted their annual Show & Share event in late April. The students chose Montessori work and prepared presentations for their family.

Since many parents did not grow up experiencing the Montessori philosophy, the Show & Share provides a great opportunity for them to see what their children are learning.

The Children's House Montessori (4K & K) program has been hosting this event since the program's inception in Amery in 2017. This year, the Lower Elementary Montessori classrooms (grades 1-3) participated for the first time.

Children's House Montessori students shared challenging work from many of their curriculum areas, a book that they authored and illustrated, their work from the Primary Phonics workbook, and read a book to their family.

Lower Elementary Montessori students conducted research projects and chose Montessori materials to demonstrate and explain to their families and classmates. Topics included climate change, unicorns, biographies, animal research, countries, botany, life cycles of the stars, and more!

The Show & Share allows parents to witness classroom activities and materials firsthand and view the skills that their children are learning. Most importantly, students are proud to share their efforts and hard work, they enjoy being the focus of attention, they feel a sense of accomplishment, and the experience helps them develop leadership and communication skills.

It is also fun for younger students and their families to see the work of the older students and observe the progress made throughout their Montessori journey. The teachers hope to include the Upper Elementary (grades 4-5) Montessori in the future.



STUDENTS MONITOR BLUEBIRD NESTING BOXES

The fifth-grade students have been learning about bluebirds and monitoring eleven nesting boxes on campus. They check the boxes weekly for nests, eggs, critters, and other species of birds such as swallows or sparrows. After students check the nesting boxes, they record their findings on a large chart near the classrooms. The charts are used to share monitoring results between classrooms.

Wisconsin's Eastern Bluebird population has suffered a decline due to habitat loss and competition from other species. By monitoring the nest boxes, students are learning about native and non-native bird species, expanding their environmental awareness, and supporting this beautiful, native Wisconsin bird.

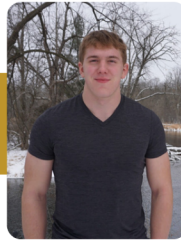

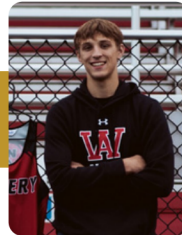

147 scholarships were presented to members of the AHS Class of 2024. Local money awarded to students totalled \$179,250. In addition to local scholarships, students were awarded money from corporations, families, and individuals outside of the Amery community including the Academic Excellence Award of \$9,000 for one student for four years and the Technical Excellence Award of \$6,750 for one student for three years. The class of 2024 has received a total of \$195,000 dollars in scholarship awards.

AMERY MIDDLE SCHOOL COLLABORATIVE ART *Every Panel Matters*

In the 7th grade Art classes, students complete a collaborative drawing as the culminating project. After spending a week practicing and learning to work with charcoal, students begin their final project - a joint effort where each student draws a designated section of a larger artwork.

Mr. Kevin Olson, Art teacher, chooses a new theme each year. Previous themes included 'African animals,' 'Americana,' and 'dogs.' This year's theme was 'farm animals.'

Olson chooses the initial photos then assigns each student a specific section of the photo to draw.

Students spend nearly two weeks completing their panels. Throughout the process, they check to see if their drawings match the adjacent panels. They compare lines and values, and sometimes they need to adjust before proceeding. Olson said that although the panels should match, he still wants the final piece to reflect the work of individual students.

What Olson likes most about this project is that it is "truly collaborative. Everyone is working together to create a single piece of art. Though students have their own panels to complete, to be successful, they have to make sure their drawings line up correctly with their classmate's drawings. There's a lot of communication and comparing of drawings, making sure edges, important details, shading, and textures are all matching."

Once the panels are completed, the whole class joins in the assembly process to witness the final product coming together. The art is displayed in the middle school cafeteria throughout the remainder of the school year. Each student is acknowledged as a contributor, yet individual names are not shown on the individual panels, creating a true sense of collaboration and ownership of the entire piece.

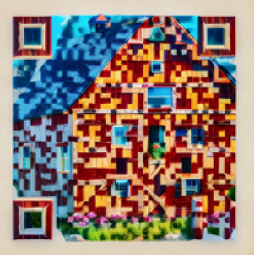


Kindergarten & HS FFA Students Plant Future Christmas Trees
